What's happening in Stage 3?



English

In Stage 3 Literacy, students will be exploring the novel 'Black Cockatoo' by Carl Merrison and Hakea Hustler. They will investigate themes related to freedom, family and Indigenous Peoples.

In Stage 3 writing, students will focus on the Talk for Writing program 'Beowulf', where they learn a model text orally and innovate the learnt text. Students will explore the key structures of a narrative and develop an understanding of language features that can be used to create a sense of suspense.

Mathematics

In Stage 3 Mathematics, students will focus on the representation and arrangement of numbers beyond a million. They will explore how fractions and decimals can be represented in different ways and interpret numerical data. Students will also develop efficient and flexible strategies for solving addition and subtraction problems. The students will use these these strategies to effectively measure length, perimeter and time.

History

In Stage 3 History, students will study a unit titled 'Australia as a Nation'. They will explore what life was life in Australia before 1901 and learn about the development of Australia as a nation. Students will investigate the factors that led to the development of democracy and citizenship and how it led to the Federation of Australia. Students will learn about the significance of Australia's British heritage, the Westminster system and other models that influenced the development of Australia's system of government.

Geography

In Stage 3 Geography, Students will explore countries of the Asia region and the connections Australia has with other countries across the world. They will investigate the diversity in geographical features within the Asia region and examine the economic, demographic and social differences between countries of the Asia region such as employment, population, and lifestyle. Students will be learning to gather, analyse, evaluate and interpret geographical information from secondary sources and demonstrate academic integrity.

Personal Development and Health (PD/H)

In Stage 3 PD/H, students will explore the concept of friendship and delve into the characteristics of a healthy friendship. Additionally, they will examine the adverse effects of alcohol, appropriate guidelines and behaviours related to alcohol consumption.

Creative arts

In Stage 3 Creative Arts, students will gain an understanding of portraiture and expressionism, with an introduction to the Archibald Prize. They will investigate various influential artists from history who have portrayed subjects in diverse styles. Throughout the unit, students will produce portraiture artworks inspired by a variety of artists.

Library

In Stage 3 Library, students will be taught History by our librarians Ms Grassi, Miss Leone and Mr Watts.

Students are strongly encouraged to bring a library bag for borrowing books, **reading them** and returning.

Physical Education (PE) and sport

In Stage 3 PE lessons, students will be focusing on soccer and Oz-tag. The goal of these lessons is to increase students' fitness and agility through engaging activities. The games are also designed to help students develop tactical skills used in sports. Each lesson will have a focus of running in preparation for the Cross Country Carnival.

Science and technology

In Stage 3 Science, students will investigate a variety of contact and non-contact forces through practical investigations, including simple ideas of force, gravity and buoyancy. Students will learn to represent scientific concepts in the form of drawings to label both push and pull forces. They will construct and launch their own model rocket and will write scientific reports, as evidence of their experiments and practical investigations. Throughout the unit students will challenge their critical and creative thinking skills.

- 2. Set mathematics tasks on https://mathspace.co/au


In addition to weekly homework students also have a **term project** that they will work on throughout the term. For term 1 students will plan, research and create a speech for the Multicultural Speaking Competition.






A user agreement will need to be completed and signed by both each student and parent before the devices are to be brought to school. This user agreement will be handed out early next year. Basic requirements are as follows:

- As part of our whole school approach to a healthy lifestyle and due to a growing number of students with allergies/anaphylaxis we ask that parents only send enough food for their own child and reminder them to **not share food at school.** I addition to this we ask that students do not bring in food for student birthdays or other celebrations.
- It is important for all students to be at school ready to start their learning day promptly at 8:45am. Students **must not** be at school prior to 8:15am. If your child needs to be dropped off earlier you must book them into before school care.
- Students are expected to bring their resources to school every day including their own device (fully charged). Students must return their BYOD note before bringing their own device to school (see example of note below). Please ensure that your child has purchased all the resources on the resource list including headphones.

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BYOD Student Responsibilities

Operating system and anti-virus:

Students must ensure they have a legal and licensed version of a supported operating system and of software. If applicable, students' devices must be equipped

with anti-virus software.

NSW Department of Education's Wi-Fi network connection only:

Student devices are only permitted to connect to the department's Wi-Fi network while at school. There is no cost for this service.

Battery life and charging:

Students must ensure they bring their device to school fully charged for the entire school day. No charging equipment will be supplied by the school.

Theft and damage:

Students are responsible for securing and protecting their devices at school. Any loss or damage to a device is not the responsibility of the school or the Department.

Maintenance and support:

Students are solely responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of their devices.

Ergonomics:

Students should ensure they are comfortable using their device during the school day particularly in relation to screen size, sturdy keyboard etc.

Data back-up:

Students are responsible for backing-up their own data and should ensure this is done regularly.

Insurance/warranty:

Students and their parents/caregivers are responsible for arranging their own insurance and should be aware of the warranty conditions for the device.

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BYOD Device Requirements

Wireless connectivity:

Primary schools: The department's Wi-Fi network installed in primary schools operates on the 802.11n 5Ghz standard. Devices that do not support this standard will not be able to connect.

Operating system:

The current or prior version of any operating system.

Software and apps:

School-based requirements. All software and apps should be fully updated.

Battery life:

A minimum of 5hrs battery life to last the school day.

Memory and RAM:

A minimum specification of 16 GB storage and 2 GB RAM to process and store data effectively.

Ergonomics:

Reasonable sized screen and a sturdy keyboard to enable continuous use throughout the day.

Other considerations

Casing: Tough and sturdy to avoid breakage.

Weight: Lightweight for ease of carrying.

Accessories

Carry case: Supply a carry case or skin to protect the device.

Insurance and warranty: Be aware of the terms of insurance policies/warranties for the device. The school will not accept responsibility for loss or breakage.

Back-up storage: Consider a portable hard drive as an appropriate source of back-up storage for essential documents.

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Talking and listening tips

- Avoid interrupting your child when they're talking and listen carefully to what they have to say.
- Use everyday opportunities to talk with and listen to your child as they share things that are of interest or importance to them.
- 5. Show your child you are interested in what they are saying when they are speaking by giving nods, smiles, sounds, supportive words and gestures. The positive feedback helps reinforce to them that what they say is important and worthwhile.
- 4. If your child has trouble remembering things said to them, it's a good idea to encourage them to repeat in their mind what has been said, then retell it in their own words. Making notes can help if they have to do a task.
- If you are planning something such as a party or an outing, try having a brainstorming session with your child. You can do this just by listening and sharing ideas or by writing them down together.
- Discuss common dates on a family calendar, such as public holidays, and have your child mark in important events.
- 7. From the calendar, talk about days, months and years in relation to events such as birthdays and other special occasions.
- 8. When walking or travelling together, talk about street names and the meaning of signs. etc. You could discuss anything known about names and signs encountered (eg give an explanation about how street names may have come about).
